### Tells Why He Left Welsh Coal Mines for Detroit

A Welshman who claims Birmingham as his native American hometown Monday noon described to local Rotarians why he "thanks God for America."

He is the Rev. Robert Richards of the Newburg Methodist church, Lyovnia, who left Wales twenty years ago to come to industrial Detroit, spend two years earning some money, then return home and "take things easy."

His first two years in America were spent in Birmingham where he learned to like life in the United States so well he gave up his idea of leaving.

his quick fortune in America, he related.

"But I'm still here and I still haven't the money," he declared. "Yet I'm the richest man in the world—because I'm FREE! What more does one want than to be free? Some people in East Berlin the other day died just TRYING to be free—and those boys in Korea are not dying there just for fun."

He said that after his first few years in this country, he determined never to criticize the United States.

"Why should I, when she's given me so much for my giving her so little?" he demanded.

"This is paradise—I'd rather live in America today with my pockets empty (like they are) than any-

where else in the world with my pockets full."

HE SAID he used to love the Britisher's Union Jack, but now he only respects it.

"My love has been transferred to the Stars and Stripes—it's my flag now, and I'm proud to go around telling other people it is mine," he emphasized.

He held out a well-known leather folder containing his citizenship papers.

"All the money in the world cannot buy these papers!" he declared. "You who are fortunate enough to have been born in the United States never will realize the value of these adoption papers to one who is given them."
