Thanks Officials For Stop Signs In Lincoln Area

 Would you be kind enough to print a copy of our letter of appreciation to Chief of Police Ralph Moxley for his cooperation in traffic control on West Lincoln?
 This is the letter:
 "On behalf of our adjoining neighbors on West Lincoln Parkway, we thank you so much for the placing of stop signs at Pleasant, Glenhurst and Arden Lane on the West Lincoln Parkway.
 "We believe that at the present time, these stop signs are the means of keeping traffic at a more reasonable rate and are still facilitating the flow of the same along our fine parkway.
 "WHERE CARS used to race past during unpatrolled periods, like thunderjets, too fast for us to obtain license numbers, we are now beginning to have less fear of letting the children use our new sidewalks.
 "The 30-day trial from the placement of these stop signs terminates around July 1. We hope that your department and the commission has also observed the improved within-the-law speed limit that now is apparent, and that you will permit the stop signs to remain.
 "Thank you again. We are happy with the results of the stop signs and ask you keep them in their present locations on West Lincoln Parkway.
