Military Services For Sgt. Green.

The body of M/Sgt. William M. Green, 32, will arrive at the Manly Bailey funeral home Saturday night. Full military services will be held from there Monday at 2 p.m., with burial in Roseland Park cemetery, with the Rev. W. Glen Harris of the First Presbyterian church officiating.

Sgt. Green, son of Police Lt. William M. Green, died in Japan on April 29, after suffering wounds in the chest.

He was born in Waterford township on Dec. 27, 1921, and attended the Birmingham public schools.

During World War II, Sgt. Green saw service in Germany, and later spent five years with the Military Police at Hedgeswood, Md. He went to Korea in March, 1952, and had been sent to Japan shortly before his death.

Besides his father, Sgt. Green is survived by his mother, Mrs. Bruce Terry of Williams Lake; four children, Judith, Beth, Susan and William M. III, all of Des Moines; a sister, Mrs. Eugene Parmenter of Birmingham and two brothers, Richard of Williams Lake and Larry of Waterford.

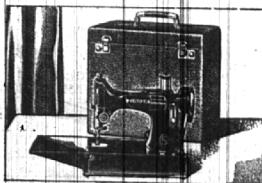

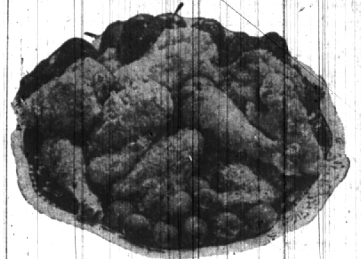
