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### Crane Runners Take Fourth Spot In Track Meet

Memorial Day, the Cranbrook School Varsity track team journeyed to Hudson, Ohio, for one of the most important meets of the season. This was the twenty-third Annual Track and Field Championships of the Inter-State Preparatory League. The track team of the League, composed of Nichols School of Buffalo, Shady Side Academy of Pittsburgh, University School of Cleveland, Western Reserve Academy of Hudson, Ohio, and Cranbrook School meet only once all year to decide the winner of the Track Cup; they have no dual meets.

This year, as in the preceding years, a strong Western Reserve team was assured of victory. The competition was hard and Lady Luck was not with the Crane cindernecks last Saturday, as they took fourth behind Western Reserve Academy and the University School in that order.

ALMOST HALF of Cranbrook's 120 points were scored in the mile run. Led by Steve Weitz, in the time of 4:52.5, the Crane milers came across the line first, second and fourth, tallying 100% of their team's points. Tom Corley, fifth and fourth, Hilliard Goldmen. Elsewhere, Grant Griswold took a third in the high jump and a tie for second in the high hurdles. Jon Thompson captured fourth in the low, Bob Reed, fourth in the 800 yard run; Jim Taylor tied for fourth in the 100 and Bob O'meara ended up in a four-way tie for fourth in the high jump.

High point man for the afternoon was speedster George Hargrove of Shady Side, who won the 100, 220, 440 and anchored his half-mile relay team to second place for a total of 100 points. His individual times were: 10.1 for the century, 22.8 in the 220, and 52.4 in the quarter.

OTHER PLURAL winners were: Bowler of Western Reserve Academy, winner of the 15.8 and the lows in 20.6, and Natt, also Academy, who took the shot put in 49 1/4 and discus in 136 7/8.

The final team score was 70 1/2 for Western Reserve, 91 for Shady Side, 108 for University School, 18 1/2 for Cranbrook School, and 24 for Nichols.

The final game ran on a single by Harry Lomason, a sacrifice and a walk to Sotker. Shady Side's Lou Mitchell, who was ineligible for all Michigan high school games, continued his hitting rampage against the Blue and Grey with a single. The Blue and Grey

scored 10 runs in the eighth, but still lost 13-12.

The record is now 11-12, including 11 victories, and two defeats. The record for the year, though, has been long awaited. Although year after year he has produced winning ball teams, this year had, for five years, yielded no group.

MANLY TIMES the Cranes have come close to toppling the title holder, however, since 1950 when the Cranes went into their final game against Shady Side with an overall record of 10 wins and seven losses, including an unbroken record in the league. That year Shady Side upset the Blue and Grey gaining a 5-1 victory.

The Blue and Grey's back-up was Captain Bill Sotker. Sotker's pitching performance, allowing only one hit, a drag bunt, was outstanding. In the first three games, he had four hits in the first and his four hits at bat helped lead the Cranes in hitting. The victory was the eighth in nine decisions. The only loss was 1-0.

The game was played at the Maskill on the outskirts of Pittsburgh. The visitors from Michigan scored twice in the first and third, and their final run in the top of the seventh. John Werl, lead-off for the Cranes, was a walk. Harry Schmitz then popped out to the pitcher. Joe Prendergast followed with a ground ball that forced Werl at second base.
