More than six thousand Girl Scouts in Southern Oakland County today are joining in a nationwide celebration of the 41st birthday of the Girl Scouts of America. Scouts are observing this anniversary by giving teas, dinners and other events for friends and parents, and between now and the end of the month, every one of 389 troops in the South Oakland area will hold anniversary celebrations.

Highlight of the birthday activities is the collection of pennies for the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund, named for the founder of the Girl Scout movement. Proceeds will go to aid Scouts in 59 countries throughout the world.

Every Girl Scout and Brownie in Birmingham has made some contribution to the fund out of her allowance.

FESTIVITIES on the local scene include a tea in the Adams school gym, to be given for two hundred Adams Brownies, Scouts, and their leaders. The troop at Baldwin school are having a tea at the Community House, and have invited some international students from Marygrove College to discuss the

Scouting program in their native lands.

Franklin troops are planning a supper for Scouts and their families, while Terry school is having a tea at school.

The Junior High group at Baxton has already had its celebration at their recent father and daughter banquet at the Community House. Money collected has already been turned over to Mrs. Lawrence E. Quinn, local Juliette Low chairman.

LAST YEAR Southern Oakland Scouts collected \$560.71 toward the World Friendship Fund which financed the twentieth annual Juliette Low session at the Scout Chalet in Switzerland, and supported various international Scout gatherings, an exchange program of Scouts and Guides from various countries, and international conferences of adult leaders.
