FRANKLIN—The grass fire season is with us again and the Franklin Volunteer Fire department responded to four calls last Saturday.

William Albee, Commissioner, asks that persons burning grass, weeds or brush be properly prepared in advance with rakes, brooms and the garden hose laid out and connected. Fires should be kept under control and should not be started without first obtaining the permit required by state law. Such permits are obtainable without charge from Bill Jones at the postoffice or from Les Fraser at the Franklin food shop.

State law also holds persons starting such fires financially responsible for any damage to the property of others. They are also subject to fines.

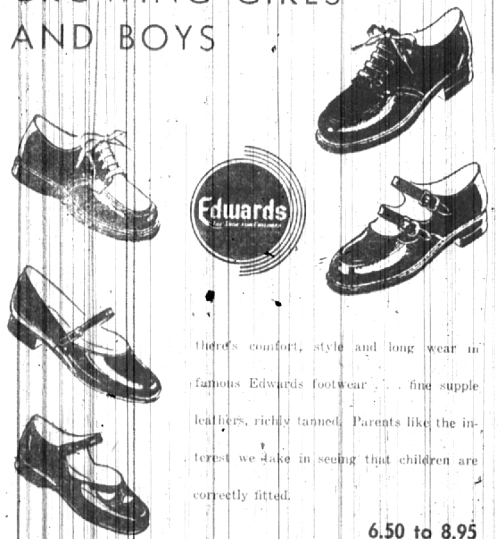
