## Southfield Tables Proposed Overhaul Of Zone Ordinance

Action on Southfield township's proposed revamping of its present zoning ordinance was tabled Tuesday night for further study.

David Geer, planning consultant, reporting on his study of the present ordinance, says it must be determined what the citizens want and a future plan outlined before zoning can be handled.

He said he proposed to eliminate many of the loopholes in the present ordinance and check the legality of every phrase of it before discarding or changing anything.

A TRAFFIC count, population forecasts, maps and a study of trends toward commercial and industrial development also would be needed, Geer explained.

Board members discussed his proposals and agreed that there was no need for a new zoning ordinance, but rather a general overhauling of the existing one.

Board member Margaret Bradbury emphasized that this overhaul should include many amendments made to the present ordinance during the past two years.

Saying he was trying to find a place to sleep, Robert L. Yooch, 21, of Hancock, was arrested here early Monday morning, charged with being drunk and disorderly.

Police were called by tenants in the apartments over the Birmingham Fruit market, Woodward avenue, who said they thought someone was trying to break in.

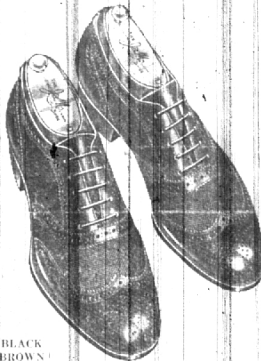

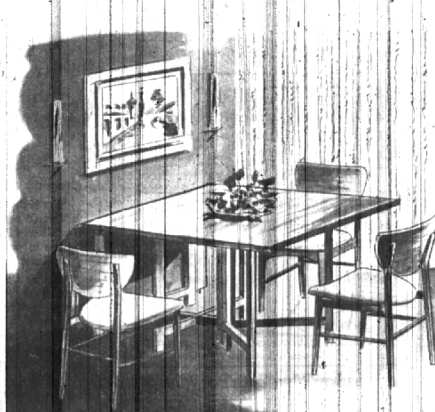

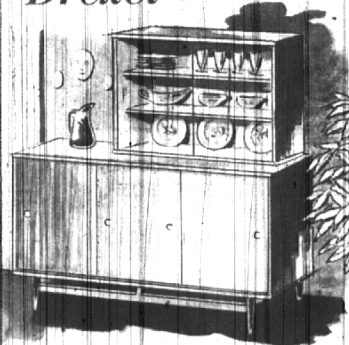
