Special Service. In Remembrance Of Eliel Saarinen

A service of remembrance, conducted by the Rev. Robert L. DeWitt, and an address in evaluation of the great architect, architect's dedication of a column in St. Dunstan's Chapel of Christ Church Cathedral to the memory of Eliel Saarinen Sunday afternoon, which was "Founders' Day" at Cranbrook.

Eminent men and women of the late Mr. Saarinen's profession, members of his family, associates in the Cranbrook families, students and friends attended the services, which concluded with the reading of the inscription cut in the stone capital of one of the massive supporting columns of the chapel.

The inscription noted his birth in Helsinki, Finland, in 1873; his coming to America in 1922; his designing and supervising construction of Cranbrook and Kingswood schools, Cranbrook Institute of Science, and Cranbrook Academy of Art; his death at Cranbrook in 1950; and concluded with these words:

"HE SEARCHED for new forms combining beauty with utility. He designed satisfying structures, cities, and objects of common use. He helped guide Academy students for his first 28 years. He made his mark here and abroad in writings and imaginative design. Let harmony replace all discord and beauty triumph over ugliness."

Henry S. Booth, chairman of the Cranbrook Foundation and of the board of trustees of the Academy of Art, who was a student of Mr. Saarinen at the University of Michigan, paid tribute to the architect in a poem in some ways, words of an artist (than architect), and as one who had "tweaked the nose of business and made the gods his horse plow with inspiration."

Children Warned Of the Dangers Near Railroads

Dangers as great and dark as frequent as on the battlefield lurk for Birmingham children who play on railroad property, the Michigan Railroad Officers Association asserts, and is conducting a campaign to save them and all other children from disaster.

"Eighty-two children died and several hundred others were badly hurt, most of them crippled, for in 1952 while playing on the nation's railroad tracks," according to Arnold B. Vecchiato, Detroit superintendent of police on the Pere Marquette street of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway. "That must never occur again. Yet it will happen if we cannot convince boys and girls that railroad property is the world's worst playground."

The campaign now under way is national in scope. More than 1,000 copies of a circular warning the dangers of playing on railroad tracks have been distributed all over America. Every school teacher in the nation's public and private schools has received a booklet. Others have come in the form of films, newspapers, radio stations, parent-teacher organizations, power lines, and state police. More than 300,000 have been distributed in Michigan.

"Every adult who has contact with children as a parent, teacher, guardian, spiritual adviser, or even an official should join in this campaign to halt a practice which is almost a death sentence for children," Vecchiato explains. "Children don't walk, but they do run. They don't court, but they do play on railroad property. It's up to their adult associates to make them understand that playing on the rails can be as dangerous to them as stepping out on a battlefield can be to a soldier."

Vecchiato, who is chairman of the safety committee of the railroad police organization, said that children not only endanger themselves playing on railroad property, but also are shot at, or shooting small-caliber guns at passing trains, have badly injured train crewmen and sometimes passengers, and have derailed trains, again sometimes causing injury to the crews, by placing obstructions on the rails.

"When our famous FBI and Washington posts in the home and urging children not to play around railroad property, one realizes how great the danger is and the great amount of damage and destruction that has been caused by the misguided playfulness of boy and girl trespassers," he said.

The railroad police officer predicted that before the present school term ends, every pupil and student in Michigan's schools will have been contacted and urged to avoid railroad trespassing.

City Approves Dumping Rates

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night approved the schedule of rates at the city dump established by the Southeastern Oakland County Council and Board of Auditors.

The charges will apply to persons other than members of the authorized household refuse collectors. The minimum charge for acceptable refuse has been set at 25 cents and the maximum will be \$3.75 for loads up to 4500 lbs. feet.
