Although the population of the Franklin area has increased notably, the number of fires in the district has decreased markedly for the second consecutive year, as reported at the Franklin Volunteer fire department's recent annual meeting. 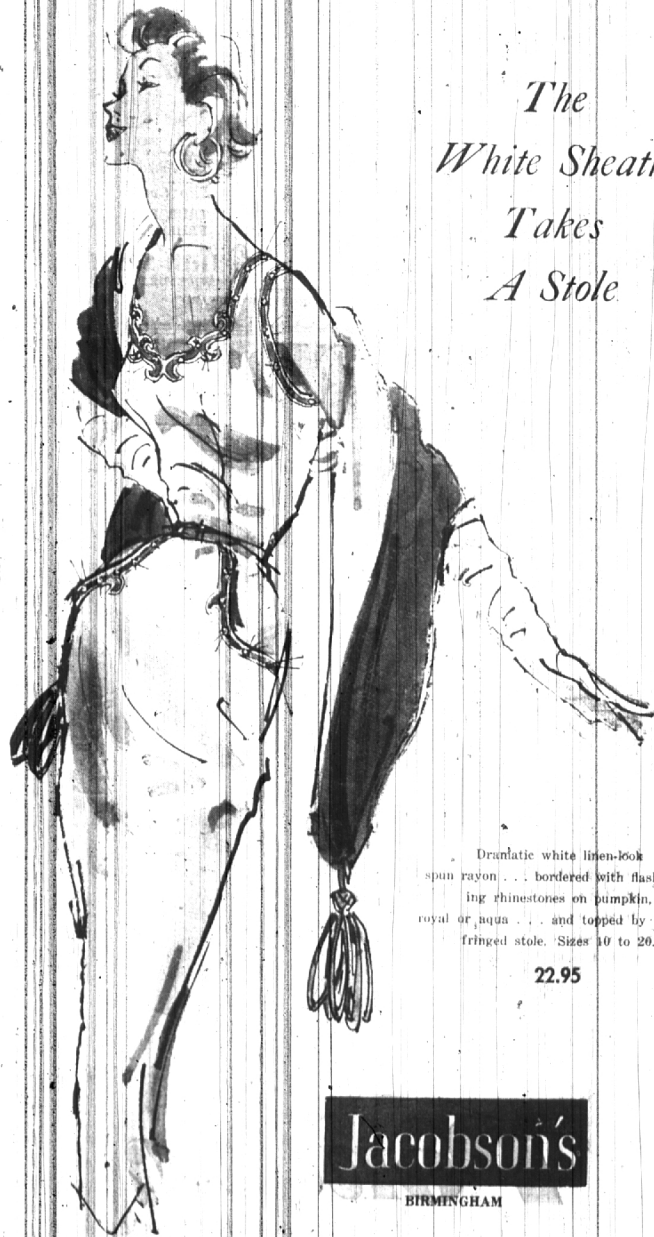
