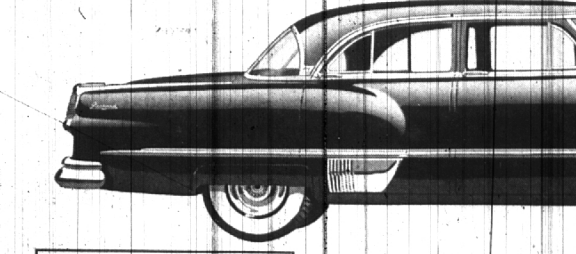

of Last Day of Registration of the Qualified Electors of School District No. 2, Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy, West Bloomfield and City of Bloomfield Hills, Oakland County, Michigan

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Please Take Notice that the Board of Education of School District No. 2, Fractional, Townships of Bloomfield, Troy and West Bloomfield and City of Bloomfield Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, has called the annual election to be held in said School District on June 8, 1953.

Section (2) of Act 199, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, effective September 28, 1951, provides as follows:

"The Inspectors of election at any annual or special election shall not receive the vote of any person residing in a registration school district whose name is not registered as an elector in the city or township in which he resides"

THE LAST DAY on which persons may register with the Clerk of the City of Township in which they reside in order to vote at said annual election called to be held June 8, 1953, is Friday, May 29, 1953. Persons registering after 5:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on said Friday, May 29, 1953 are not eligible to vote at said annual election.

Under the provisions of Act 199, Public Acts of Michigan 1951, registrations will not be taken by school officials, and only persons who have registered as general electors with the Clerk of the City or Township in which they reside are registered school electors. Persons planning to register with City and Township Clerks must ascertain the days and hours on which the Clerk's office is open for registration.
