

**High Twelve to Hear Of Masonic Activities, 'South of the Border'**

Police Commissioner Donald Leonard, of Detroit, has been rescheduled and will speak for the club on Dec. 7. The Dec. 14 meeting will have William Rainey of the Federal Mogul corporation giving an historical talk on "Aaron Burr."

**New Laws Govern Taxicabs, Signs, Dumps and Police**

In a flurry of legislative activity, Southfield township board members Tuesday night passed four ordinances that have been hanging fire on township agendas for several weeks.

First of the four was the creation of a taxicab ordinance aimed at controlling operations of cab companies within the township.

The township has one company serving the area at the present, with firms from other neighboring cities to both pickup and discharge passengers in Southfield.

The ordinance would deny outside firms the right to pickup fares in the township without a township license and would give the township board the power to issue cab permits.

Initial cost of the cab plates has been set at \$20. The ordinance will become effective 30 days after publication.

PROBABLY the most important ordinance agreed upon was the law backing formation of a township police department. This ordinance, though simple, gives broad powers to the department and sets up the organization of personnel.

The law outlines the objectives of police protection and carries the responsibility of the township civil service commission's duties in acting on personnel relations.

A long-sought ordinance that also met with board favor was a dump ordinance.

In what board members termed a "strong ordinance" are requirements for township operating permits, annual licenses, truck licenses, cash bonds, actual operating methods of dumps and types of material to be dumped.

UNDER TERMS of the ordinance, owners of property wishing to create a dumping area must first secure the consent of 80 per cent of surrounding neighbors and then satisfy both requirements that their operations will comply with the law.

Owners of present dumps in Southfield also must obtain a permit and meet fencing and soil-covering restrictions of the ordinance.

The fourth action concerned township regulation of sign boards. The ordinance calls for maximum sizes of signs to be allowed, their construction and set-back distances from streets.

The ordinance merely strengthens an existing sign ordinance on township books.

**Berkley Bears To Face Maples**

The Berkley Bears, described as one of their most erratic teams in years, will invade Birmingham Friday night with hopes of upsetting the Maples for the first time since 1950.

Led by Dick Radatz, a six foot four inch end, the Bears have a team with great potential in their back and line.

Under their new coach Fred Houlder, the Bears executed the T formation and single wing with the line unbalanced to either the left or right.

Thus far this year Berkley has had a mediocre season, beating Ferndale 27-0, Walled Lake 33-0 and Farmington 24-7. Their losses have been to Melvindale 18-0, Southfield 14-13, Rochester 20-0, Waterford 41-7, and last week they were routed 43-7 by Van Dyke.

The Maples and Berkley have only two common foes. One is Ferndale which Birmingham defeated 7-6 and Waterford whom the maroon and white defeated last week 14-6.

These interviews are in preparation for the Court of Honor awards planned for December 17.

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
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
