

Emergency Funds Sought by Hills School Board

The late fall famine has struck the Bloomfield Hills board of education.

The board, like many others in the area, has found that its bills from now to January, will exceed its expected revenue.

At its monthly meeting Monday night, the board authorized Board Treasurer Robert Sadler to make arrangements to borrow the money necessary to meet expenses until the first of the year when tax revenues will replenish the treasury.

The board decided Sadler should arrange for a loan of not more than \$30,000 to be secured by anticipated tax money. The loan is to run for no more than 60 days. Sadler reported to the board that the interest on this amount would run about \$150 for the 60 days.

BOARD PRESIDENT Edward Proctor said this is the first time in the school history that such a loan has been sought.

"We have received advances on our tax money before, but this is the first time we have had to borrow expense money," he stated.

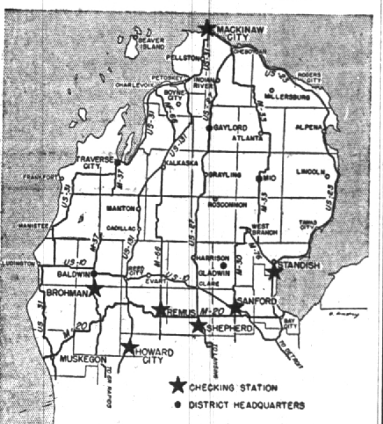
At the meeting the board set Monday, Dec. 7, as the date for a special meeting when the board will meet with teachers of the district to discuss teachers' salary schedules.

Superintendent of Schools Eugene L. Johnson told the board that the teachers have been conducting meetings to draw up a formal presentation of their salary suggestions to the board.

THE BOARD also voted to canvass the bond election results following the closing of the polls at 8 p. m. Monday night, Nov. 23. Secretary David Lee was instructed to acknowledge receipt of request from the Citizens for Better Schools Committee to have vote challengers present at the election.

The conservation department is again this year calling on hunters to help in the Michigan deer management program. Checking stations will be located at Brohman, Howard City, Remus, Shepherd, Sanford and Standish during the first three days of the November 15-30 deer season and again during the special season on December 1. Sub-stations also will be located at Gaylord, Traverse City, Mio, Baldwin and Gladwin during those days to check deer for age, physical condition and sex. Hunters are asked to voluntarily stop at any of these stations to give department biologists chance to gather the necessary information.
