REGULATIONS

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND DISPOSAL OF REFUSE AND OTHER WASTES WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF SOUTHFIELD. Section 1. From and after the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to deposit, store, pile, dump, or otherwise dispose of refuse or other waste within the limits of the Township of Southfield, Michigan, except as provided in this ordinance. Section 2. No new dump shall be established or operated in the Township of Southfield, Michigan, after the effective date of this ordinance unless and until the operator thereof has obtained a permit from the Township Clerk authorizing such operation, and shall comply with all of the provisions herein set forth. Section 3. Application for an initial permit to operate a dump shall be made to the Township Clerk in such form as may be furnished by the Township Clerk. Section 4. Prior to action by the Township Clerk upon the application for a permit to operate a dump, the applicant shall contract not less than eighty (80%) of the property owners within a five hundred (500) feet of the outer limit of the dump, and shall present to such householders, in writing, a copy of the application for a permit to operate a dump, and shall obtain their consent and approval in writing. Section 5. In the event the applicant is unable to secure the signature of at least eighty (80%) per cent of the adjacent residents, he shall present to the Township Clerk along with the foregoing prescribed consent, a written declaration that he has contacted at least ten (10) percent of the adjacent residents, naming them and giving their addresses, and stating that the said residents executed the consent required by this ordinance. Section 6. The consent of the adjacent residents and the affidavit of the applicant shall be considered a preliminary condition, and shall not be deemed binding upon the Township Board with respect to the issuance or non-issuance of the required permit. Section 7. In addition to the foregoing requirements, the applicant shall pay to the Township Clerk at the time of filing his application the license fee as provided in the schedule hereinafter provided. Section 8. When all of the foregoing requirements have been met by the applicant, the Township Clerk shall file the matter of the application to the Township Board at the time of its next meeting, at which time the Township Board shall consider the application in light of the provisions of this ordinance and shall, if it deems it proper, issue a permit to the applicant, which shall be subject to the provisions herein contained. Every violation of the regulations herein established with respect to the operation or maintenance of a dump shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, and separate offense for which the operator of said establishment may be punished in the manner hereinafter provided. Section 9. No dump of any kind shall be established within the Township of Southfield for the purpose of disposing of or treating oil, grease, animal waste or products or vegetable foodstuffs, nor for the purpose of disposing of any inflammable liquid, resin, paint, resin or similar products, chemical, industrial or household waste which is not completely inert and devoid of any offensive odor or nature whatsoever. All materials deposited in any dump shall be free and clean of any of the aforesaid products and shall be of such a nature as to cause no attraction to flies, rodents or other vermin. Section 10. No dump of any kind shall be established within the Township of Southfield for the purpose of disposing of or treating oil, grease, animal waste or products or vegetable foodstuffs, nor for the purpose of disposing of any inflammable liquid, resin, paint, resin or similar products, chemical, industrial or household waste which is not completely inert and devoid of any offensive odor or nature whatsoever. All materials deposited in any dump shall be free and clean of any of the aforesaid products and shall be of such a nature as to cause no attraction to flies, rodents or other vermin. Section 11. All refuse and material deposited in any dump shall be so placed or located that, when the dump is discontinued and covered, there shall be a covering of two (2) feet of clean, undisturbed earth over all and every portion of such refuse, and the grade of such covered dump shall be not more than one foot higher than the grade of the surrounding land. No refuse shall at any time be deposited in any manner so as to cause the top of such deposit to be higher than one (1) foot below the grade of the surrounding land. It shall be unlawful to establish any dump which shall not in its operation provide for the disposal of refuse in a hole or deposit below the level of the surrounding terrain; provided, however, that the hole or depression may be either a natural or a man-made depression, and in the latter case, the hole or depression shall be covered with a concrete or masonry surface. Section 12. All refuse deposited in any dump shall be covered at least once each week with not less than twelve (12) inches of clean earth free from any of the products or refuse of said dump. Section 13. No refuse, except as hereinafter provided, shall be burned in any dump at any time provided, however, that in any dump area large enough to permit it, an area may be set aside, separated from all other refuse, where trees, branches, clean wood, bushes and brush may be burned; provided, further, that the burning area shall be so located that no portion of the fire shall contact in any manner any other refuse or debris in the dump; and provided, further, that no refuse or other material shall be taken place within the prior consent of the owner or Acting Chief of the Township Fire Department who shall consider the fire safety and health of the community and enforce such safeguards as in his opinion shall be necessary. Section 14. No oil, grease, animal waste, or products, chemical, industrial or household waste which is not completely inert and devoid of any offensive odor or nature whatsoever, shall be deposited in any dump or otherwise disposed of in any manner so as to cause an unsightly appearance or be the breeding place of rodents or vermin. Section 15. No dump shall be established within one hundred (100) feet of the outer limits of the property devoted to such dump nor shall any refuse be located within two hundred (200) feet of any street or highway right-of-way or within two hundred (200) feet of any residential property. All property devoted to such dump shall be fenced around its outer limits in such a way as to provide proper control of the property and to prevent unauthorized persons from having access to said premises. No gate or roadway shall be open to a street used exclusively for residential purposes; and not more than one entrance and exit shall be maintained. Section 16. No refuse deposited in any dump shall be removed from the premises of the dump thereafter and the operator of such dump shall establish such precautions, safeguards and supervision as may be necessary for the enforcement of this regulation. Section 17. No operator of any dump shall permit any vehicle to enter the premises occupied by the dump for the purpose of depositing refuse thereat unless said vehicle has been licensed for the hauling of such refuse by the Township

of Southfield. Any person, corporation, or municipality desiring to obtain a permit for a vehicle shall apply to any dump established in the Township of Southfield, Michigan, and shall pay to the Township Clerk the Township Clerk shall make such investigation as may be necessary to insure that the vehicle is in proper condition for the hauling of refuse. The Township Clerk shall issue a permit to haul refuse away from any of the refuse on said dump during the time it is hauled to the dump. If the vehicle is so licensed, and upon receipt of the permit, the operator of such vehicle shall receive a permit authorizing him to transport all proper types of refuse to the dump within the Township of Southfield. The Township Clerk shall issue a permit to haul refuse to the dump, and a sticker to be affixed to the lower right hand corner of the windshield of the vehicle so licensed, and no vehicle shall deliver refuse to any dump without such permit and without the said sticker being affixed to the windshield of the vehicle. Section 18. All permits used as aforesaid within the said Township shall be subject to inspection by the Township Board at any time. The Township Board may, upon twenty-four (24) hours notice permit to operate any dump, revoke the permit if any violation of the aforesaid regulations is observed. Section 19. The license for both the operation of a dump and for the vehicle hauling refuse in the dump shall be deemed annual licenses. The first license shall be deemed to run from the date of its issuance until December 31st of the same year. Thereafter, all licenses shall be renewable from year to year after the initial licenses for each dump, shall be issued as a matter of course, upon the payment of the annual fee and the furnishing of the required bond. License fees for the first fractional year and for each full year thereafter shall be as follows: For a dump—\$4.00 and maintenance of a dump—\$2.00 per acre but not less than \$12.00 nor more than \$20.00. For each vehicle hauling refuse to any dump—\$4.00. For the purpose of computing the license fee for the acreage of a dump as described in the application shall be deemed to be the licensed area. Section 20. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment not to exceed thirty (30) days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. Nothing herein provided shall prevent the Township from applying to the Circuit Court for such other relief as may be suitable in any case of any violation or series of violations. Section 21. As a condition to the issuance of a permit or license to operate a dump, the applicant shall furnish a cash bond to insure compliance with the provisions of this ordinance. The bond shall be in the amount of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars and shall be payable to the Township of Southfield. In the event of any violation of this ordinance, the results in the creation of a nuisance, or threat to the health, safety or welfare of any person or property, or if the Township employees may enter upon the premises under any appropriate means under such conditions as the Township operator thereof. The full cost of such corrective action, as well as any other expenses, court costs, attorneys' fees, and all other costs shall be payable by the operator of the dump, or in default thereof may be collected from the cash bond and received under the terms of this ordinance. Section 22. All ordinances and parts of ordinances heretofore enacted and hereby repealed. This ordinance shall become effective on thirty (30) days after the publication thereof as required by the provisions of the State of Michigan. Adopted November 10, 1953.
