WE HEARD IT SAID BY—

PHAM CITY ATTORNEY FORBES S. HASCALL: "An examination of the zoning ordinance of the city of Birmingham discloses that since adoption of the ordinance in 1937, there has been a total of 28 changes in zoning. Since June 1947, there have been but 11 changes in zoning. One of the changes was adopted in 1948 and applied to property which was newly annexed to the city. It can hardly be called a change in zoning, therefore, but rather an establishing of zoning, thus reducing the total number of changes to 10. In two instances, the zoning was raised, while in eight it was changed to a lower classification."

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
