A distinguished visitor from Denmark, Edith Ryssell, women's editor of "Berlingske Tidende", oldest newspaper in Copenhagen, was a houseguest for several days last week in the Oak Hill drive home of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred E. Grann.

Here at the invitation of the state department to study, from the woman's angle, our methods of fund-raising for charitable purposes, Miss Ryssell expressed international news and is liaison between newspapers and foreign embassies. Her findings on what the American woman contributes to charity will be presented to the Danish government.

Mr. and Mrs. Grann recently returned from four months abroad as volunteer student counselors for exchange university students under the sponsorship of the American Scandinavian foundation. They visited and counseled American students in Norway, Sweden and Denmark and accompanied 34 students to the Michigan area on the return trip.

The Granns also serve as consultants to trainees in the professional and industrial fields, one of whom was Miss Naia Bildson, of Copenhagen. A registered nurse, she was a guest in the Grann home while acquiring specialized training at the University of Michigan and Detroit hospitals. She departed last week for the west coast where she will study operating techniques at the Cedars of Lebanon hospital in Hollywood.

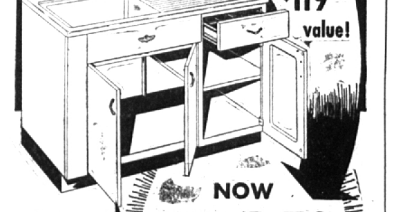
