## Vandalism Mars Hallow'en Fun In Birmingham

Hallow'en horse play has been held responsible for several instances of property destruction in Birmingham last week, according to Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley. The most frequently reported type of vandalism was breaking of windows.

Thursday night a woman living on Pierce street called to say that a group of boys had been rapping on her windows for several successive nights and that they had finally broken one.

THE SAME NIGHT a man residing on Lakeside reported 11 panes had been broken out of a large window in his home. In this case, several boys were rounded up by police and admitted to having broken the window.

Lt. Henry Timm has been assigned to take appropriate action in the case, according to Chief Moxley.

In other cases, a window was broken in a garage on W. Maple, another house window was broken on Mohegan, a house on Pierce was sprayed with blue ink, an aerial and sidewalk were damaged on a lady's car on Southfield, and traffic signs were found damaged in different parts of the city.

SEVERAL BOYS were called in to explain why they broke a window out of one of the police patrol cars. They also reported to Lt. Timm and will be expected to pay for replacement of the window, according to Chief Moxley.

This is just a case of the youngsters getting carried away, said Chief Moxley, "but they will be held responsible for their acts. It might be well for parents to be reminded that a new law makes them liable for damage caused by their children up to the amount of \$300."

## 4 Locations Get Fire Hydrants

Installation of \$1,800 worth of fire hydrants at four locations has been ordered by the Birmingham city commission.

New hydrants will go at Eton and Villa, Eton and Holland, Webster and Hunter, and on Cole street east of Eton.

"This is the start in filling in some blanks in our fire protection," explained Fire Chief Vern W. Griffith. "The city has been growing rapidly, and more new hydrants will be needed."
