City's 1st Quarter Expenses Slightly Below Estimates

For the first quarter of its fiscal year, the city of Birmingham is operating 6.44 per cent below its budgeted amounts, City Finance Director William Johnson has reported to the city commission.
 The city has allocated \$249,859 for the first quarter, but spent \$16,100.77 less than this amount, he explained.
 He said the general operating division is \$7,455.80 under the total quarter allotment, miscellaneous appropriations under by \$8,250.29, and contingent-current operating \$39,458 below allotments.
 During 1953-54, the city budget has been set up for a total expenditure of \$1,171,405.

Weakened Maples Face Waterford

An injury ridden Birmingham high school football team will meet Waterford on the Skippers' home field tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 for their only day-time game before Royal Oak.

Thus far this year, Waterford has compiled a very impressive record of four wins, two losses, and one tie. The Skips have beaten Southfield, Walled Lake, Farmington, and last week swapped Berkeley 41-7. Their only losses were to highly touted Van Dyke and to Southfield in their first game.

The Blue Wave uses the single wing formation to either the left or right with the line unbalanced to the shifted side.

In the tailback position will be Kerry Keating, sprint champion of the Inter-Lakes league, who will do most of the running and is adept as a passer also.

This week Waterford elected Dick Tims and Pat O'Neil as game captains because of their hard work in last week's game and their flaming spirit during this week's practice.

Also outstanding for the Skippers this season is Ray Campbell, speedy right halfback, who has developed into one of the toughest backs in the league.

Waterford's coach Walt Ashley said, "I have scouted Birmingham twice now and in my estimation it will be the roughest team we will face all season. We don't look for any pushover."

Birmingham's squad worked hard this week to fill in places of injured and ill players, to work the kinks out of their offense, and set up a defense that will stop Waterford.

Oiling of Streets In Sheffield Area Fails to Pass

Sheffield subdivision residents Monday night were unsuccessful in their attempts to have the city, at its own expense, maintain an oil surface on the area's streets.
 As a result, the subdivision may find itself going through another year of badly deteriorating streets.
 Commissioners, by a 4 to 1 vote, decided it was not necessary for the city to go through with a proposed oiling.
 The city would have been obliged to have a better surface for at least the next two years.

ALTHOUGH FOUR commissioners after the assessment, the motion did not carry because the city charter required at least five affirmative votes when special assessments are proposed by the city commission itself rather than on petition of the owners in the area to be assessed.
 Speaking for the group, Albert Voss, 1835 Banbury, insisted that the city in the early 1930's accepted the streets and said it would maintain them.
 At that time, discussion evidenced, the streets had a thin asphaltic topping. Sheffield property owners claimed the city thus had agreed to maintain them in that condition.
 Commissioners, however, said the records were not clear as to the city's obligation on the matter, and it was too expensive for the city to maintain dustproof road surfaces without a special assessment.
