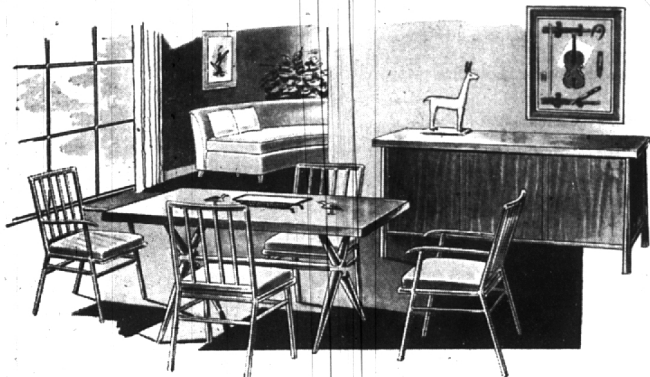

Life of Eskimo Depicted by Art In Nov. Lecture

Eskimos of Barfin Land will be the subject this week of an illustrated lecture and an exhibition opening at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

Entitled "The Land of the Long Day", the lecture will be given by James A. Houston at 815 P.M. Friday, Nov. 6, in Cranbrook School auditorium. Although tickets are issued only to members of Cranbrook Institute of Science, membership is open to the public at a nominal fee.

Houston, an artist and traveler, has made many trips to the Arctic, and is credited with introducing Eskimo stone carving to a wide buying public in the United States, Canada and England.

Some of the 30,000 hand-carved objects that Mr. Houston has collected on his visits to Eskimo country will be on display during November and December at the museum of Cranbrook Institute of Science, which is open free to the public daily from 2 to 5 p.m.

Since Eskimo life is governed entirely by hunting, most of the hand-sized carvings depict the hunter and the seals, bears, mink and smaller animals he stalks for food and clothing.

The sleekness and agility of animals is imitated with assurance by a people whose observation and dissection of game has given them a fine anatomical basis for their art.

Every Eskimo is an artist, as well as a hunter, builder, tailor and entertainer. His tools for carving consist of knives made from scrap metal, a bow-drill and stones for polishing. Carvings are usually submerged for several days in seal oil to give the stone a dark gloss which brings out swirls of rich red and green.

Some authorities believe that the Eskimo carves animals to gain magical control over them so that they may easily be captured for food. Others think that, on the contrary, he is satisfying a common human urge to draw or sculpt for the simple pleasure of creating objects.

In either case, the characteristic Eskimo good humor and playfulness are reflected strongly in his art, along with his awe of the spirits that hide in the blizzard and beneath the water when the hunter has failed and the caches are empty.

A selection of the art works on exhibition at Cranbrook Institute of Science will be for sale. The showing and sale is sponsored by a non-profit organization called Eskimo Art, Inc., of which Dr. Robert T. Hatt, director of the Institute, is a trustee.

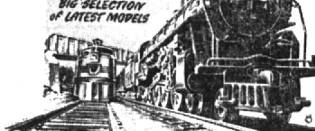

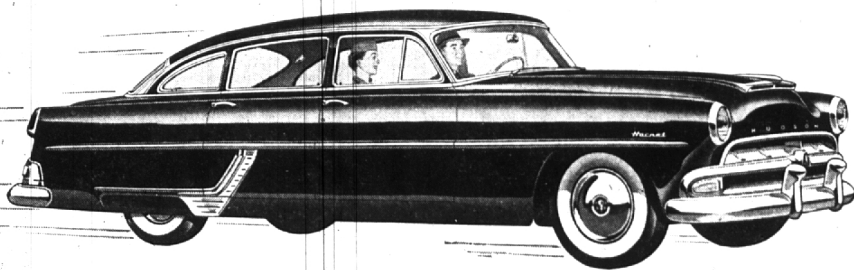

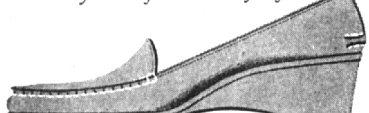
