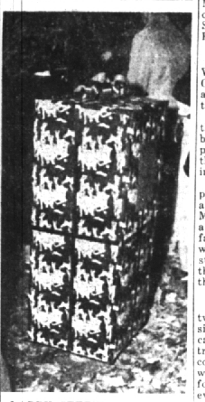

The schedule follows: 9 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.—girls No. 1 class; 9:30 a.m. to 10 a.m.—boys No. 1 class; 10 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.—girls No. 2 class; 10:30 a.m. to 11 a.m.—boys No. 2 class; 11:30 a.m. to 12 noon—mixed class.
 Registrations may be made by phone, or by letter, to the Birmingham Recreation board at the Hill school.
 Locker rooms at the school will be open 15 minutes before the start of each class. Children are instructed to bring their bathing suits, a towel, and a small piece of soap, and NO valuables. Girls are to bring bathing caps.
 Parents are invited to observe classes from the stands.
 Frank Whitney, director of the board, states that "Expert instruction will be given on learning how to swim, how to improve basic strokes and kicks, and on conducting oneself near the water."

Ray Maguire Relates Highlights of Trip To England, France

A trip to Europe is most educational and satisfies a desire that abounds in most everyone, but take it from Ray Maguire, golf professional at Birmingham Country Club, who has just returned from Great Britain and the Continent, the same money spent on an American vacation would undoubtedly prove the better bargain.

Prices are very high there and most everything from food and lodging to the various types of entertainment are inferior to what the average American has become accustomed, he said.

The popular Birmingham golf professional was given an all-expense-paid trip to the Ryder Cup golf matches in England, in appreciation for his efforts spent in helping Birmingham Country Club promote the National PGA Tournament here last summer.

Maguire, his wife Judy and son Denny, accompanied by Warren Orlick, professional at Tam O'Shanter Country Club here and Mrs. Orlick, sailed from New York on the Queen Mary on the 23rd of September and landed at Southampton on the 28th.

IN LONDON, the party met Walter Burkemo of Franklin Hills Country Club who had flown over a few days earlier as a member of the American Ryder Cup team.

While Burkemo participated in the matches, Maguire and Orlick became aids to the British Press providing data regarding golf in the United States as well as their impressions of the matches.

The Ryder Cup matches were played on the Wentworth Course, about 12 miles from London. Maguire stated that this course and St. Andrews were the two famous British courses on which he was privileged to play and both struck him as being much better than he had been led to believe they would be.

BOTH OF them measured between 6,000 and 6,400 yards, considerably shorter than the American championship courses. They're tricky and tough with many trees coupled with the ever prevailing winds creating plenty of problems for the American Ryder Cuppers, even though they won the matches easily.

On Oct. 4, immediately after the matches, the team and the entire group of Americans who were with them, went to Paris where the first International Golf matches were held on the continent.

In these specially arranged matches, members of the Ryder Cup team, as well as Maguire and Orlick and other available Americans, were matched with pro-

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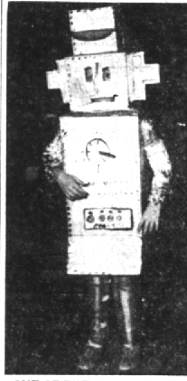
