## Franklin Plans Workshop Season For Youngsters

The Art Workshop for children in the Franklin area will begin its second winter season at the Franklin Community House in November.

According to Mrs. Winthrop Conrad, chairman, three separate workshops will be held this year. Each will run for six consecutive Saturday mornings. Classes are divided according to grade levels. Children from the first through third grades will meet from 10 to 11 a.m.; fourth through sixth grades, 11 a.m. to noon.

The first workshop will begin Nov. 14 ending on Dec. 19. The second will be Jan. 9 through Feb. 13. The third will be March 6 through April 10.

THE WORKSHOP program has been pioneered in this area by the Detroit Institute of Arts and has been adopted in other communities. The Franklin Workshop which closely follows the museum's experience was very successful last year.

Under Mrs. Elliott's direction children will explore other media such as claywork, collages, papier mache, mobiles and block printing. Registrations will be taken at this time for any of the workshops of the whole series by Mrs. Conrad.

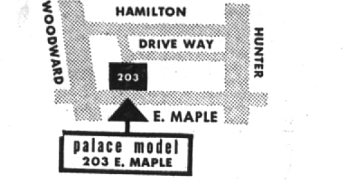
All graduates, those who attended, and friends of the University of Michigan, may attend the meeting. Mrs. Fred A. Henry is social chairman.

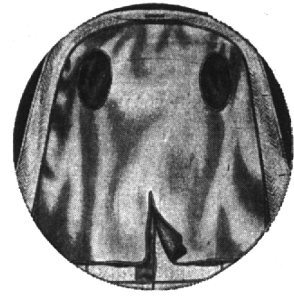

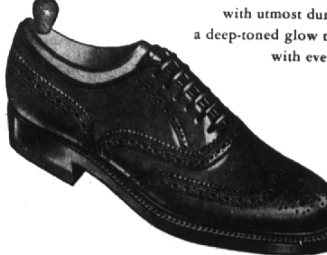


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
