

World Community Day Observance Tomorrow

Birmingham's annual celebration of World Community Day will feature a talk by Mrs. Beulah Whitty, when the program is held at Embury Methodist church at 2 p.m., on Nov. 6. Her topic will be "Building Lasting Peace."

Members of the 10 participating churches of the Birmingham Council of Church Women will highlight their part in the program as they package the many items received in their "Helps for Homes" campaign.

Home helps this year include blankets, sheets, pillow cases, curtains and drapes, tablecloths, layettes, afghans and towels. In many cases, bed coverings have been

ITEMS OBTAINED through these funds will go to help war victims wherever the need arises. The speaker will include in her remarks the importance of bringing physical comfort and mental aid to these persons if a lasting peace can ever be achieved.

A graduate of Oberlin college, she has a master's degree in social work from the University of Michigan and a certificate from the New York School of Social Work. For several years she was with the Detroit department of public welfare, starting as a case worker and progressing through the ranks to the post of administrative supervisor in charge of the Alfred district, largest in the city.

DURING THE war she became executive secretary of the emergency welfare and education service for civil defense, on leave of absence from Detroit.

Since 1944 she has been assistant director of the Detroit International committee, director of the division of education. During this time she has also been an instructor in the Wayne university graduate school of social work.

She has held several other civic and welfare posts in fields related to her work and since February, 1953, has been on the mayor's international committee in Detroit.

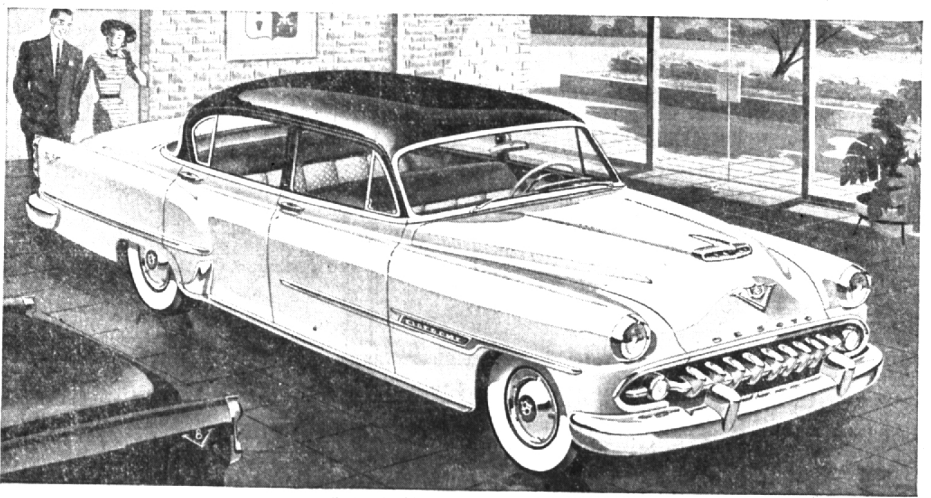

1. Plant REGAL LILIES now for extraordinary beauty in July and August.
2. Put your TULIPS to bed now. (Be sure they have their little brown nighties on—although they can sleep in the raw all right)
3. Plant PAPERWHITE NARCISSUS on Nov. 14th for bloom on Christmas Day. (With reservations of course.)
4. Buy PEAT MOSS and MARSH HAY NOW but don't put it on until ground freezes.
5. Leave parsnips in ground until spring to improve flavor. (Some people leave them in forever.)
7. Dig or plow up vegetable garden now so hibernating insects will perish.
8. Cover strawberry patch with PEAT MOSS or MARSH HAY.
9. Cut away LILAC SUCKERS and add DRIED CATTLE MANURE.
10. Wrap newly planted shade trees with TREE WRAP to prevent sunscald.
11. If grass is over 2" high cut it.
