FRANKLIN—The Volunteer fire department will have a new and more effective siren in place Saturday afternoon and will be testing it then. The old one and one-half horsepower siren atop the community hall, while it lifted nearby residents out of their chairs or beds, failed to get the attention of volunteers in the corners of the Franklin area.

The new siren, rated at five-horsepower and mounted high on a pole on cemetery hill, its two horns facing east and west, has a deeper note for greater carrying power. At the same time it should be less nerve-wracking to residents in the center of the village.
