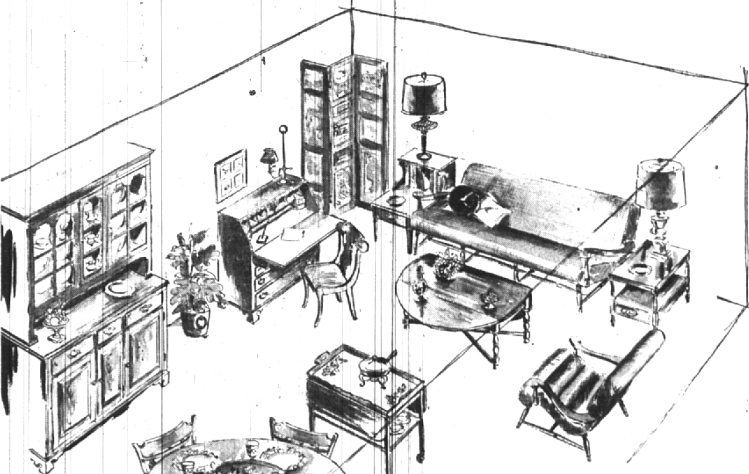

Detergent aids in cleaning duck!

To make the job of cleaning a duck less of a chore, try adding a couple of tablespoons of detergent to the boiling water. Then dip the duck and notice how much more easily the feathers come off.

Keep your wooden decoys in good shape by using a small paint touch-up kit. This prevents the wood from swelling when exposed to water for extended periods and thus cracking the rest of the paint.

One thing that will "spook" ducks more quickly than anything else is an upturned face or moving hands. Movements show up in marked contrast to the dead brown of the marsh reeds and grass. Keep your head down and your hands covered whenever possible.
