The Apprentice Theatre at Will-O-Way opens classes on Oct. 2. Ten classes are already filled and several more are in the process. At the last report, enrollments were still being accepted.

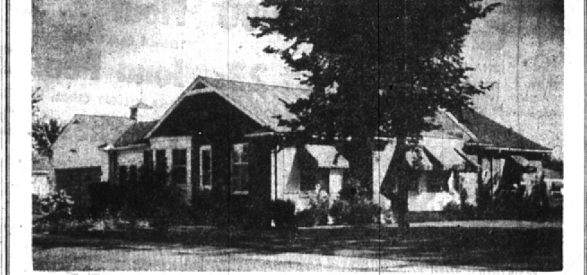

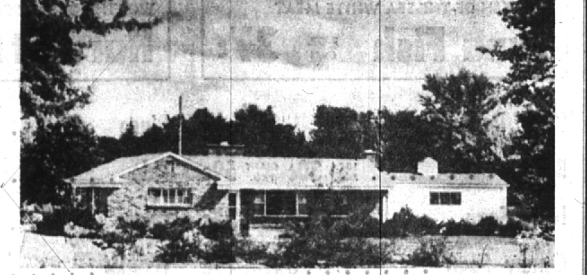
