Included in her selections for Thursday's program are Debussy's "Reflections in the Water" and "Barcarole," Opus 6, by Griffes.

OTHER artists to perform at the tea will be Elsie Moon, soprano, accompanied by Dorothy Gilton; John Gasaway, oboist; and John Boulton, flutist.

As a member of the Musicals, Elsie Moon has also appeared in previous performances for the group, and has sung in programs in the east. She was formerly a student of Harry Spier of New York and Fred Foyd of Detroit. Currently, she is a member of the choir of St. James' Episcopal church in Birmingham. Among the numbers she has chosen are "Papine" by William Defesch, "Under the Greenwood Tree" by Thomas Arne, and an air from Peris' "Euridice."

MISS GASSAWAY and John Boulton, both of whom are members of the Birmingham Musicals Junior League, are seniors at Birmingham high school and play in the band. They both won the Musicals' scholarships for the Youth Summer Music school at Michigan State college this past summer.
