UN Celebration Features Speaker From Association

Clark M. Eichelberger, Director of the American Association for the United Nations, will be in Birmingham Thursday, Oct. 20, to speak at the Community House on "Facts and Fallacies"

Eichelberger long has been associated with the UN in various ways. He was consultant to the United States Delegation to the San Francisco Conference. Previously he attended the Dumbarton Oaks conferences which framed the resolutions of the U. S. Delegation. A man devoted to the cause of the UN, he has built the American Association for the United Nations to bring to the American people deeper understanding of the problems confronting the United Nations.

"WE CAN'T do it alone," says Eichelberger. "The world has become a neighborhood, but we haven't learned to be neighbors."

Eichelberger, a lawyer and lecturer, newspaper man and radio commentator, and student of international relations will be in Birmingham as part of the city's program to celebrate UN Week. His appearance is being sponsored by the League of Women Voters in cooperation with the Mayor's Committee for "United Nations Week."

The lecture will be held at 8:30 p.m. and Russell Barnes, well known commentator on world events, will introduce the speaker.

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
