**Industrial, Labor Relations Topic of AAUW Guest Speaker**

"It is being recognized by large business organizations that university programs are successful in helping them to understand human relationships," Ardemis Kouzian, told members and guests of the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women at their Oct. 14 luncheon meeting.

Miss Kouzian, capital district director of the extension division, School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University, was the guest speaker and provided a discussion for AAUW's social studies program. Mrs. Charles C. Layman introduced Miss Kouzian who outlined the services offered by her school.

Its purpose, she pointed out, is to change existing attitudes between labor and management. Working in conjunction with community needs, the extension division sets up two types of programs: community and special service.

BOTH types of programs are the result of requests made to Cornell University. The first type of program is geared to a specific community. It is not set up until a representative has visited the town or city to acquaint himself with its background and types of people.

The latter, for example, may desire a grievance procedure class and the School of Industrial Labor Relations is prepared to offer it. The extension service finds that the discussion method of teaching is far superior to the lecture method in projecting their material to adults, and teachers are recruited from universities and from industry alike.

QUALIFICATIONS are necessarily high because the teachers are responsible for the success of the extension. "Business realizes an objective, impersonal group is better equipped to compare or draw parallels than one within the organization."

In closing, Miss Kouzian emphasized the importance of the extension program of her school. The off-campus group brings educational facilities to communities throughout New England and New York state.

It promotes an understanding of industrial and labor relations, it makes for more effective cooperation.

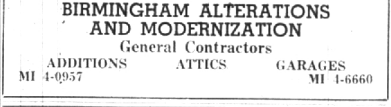

**Book Sale Prevue Attracts Many; 1,780 Items Sold**

Sunday's preview of the 1953 AAUW book sale attracted a total of 34 persons representing 15 schools, 4 libraries and 2 children's homes.

This group purchased 1,780 books and magazines along with several games, records, record albums and pictures. The cost, \$448.97, was paid by an area gentleman who prefers to remain unknown to the public.

Mrs. William Keigel and Mrs. C. W. Blomman are general chairmen in charge of sales. They are being assisted by Mrs. Carl Binkle, Mrs. Ralph B. Boebe, Mrs. J. E. Eckensrode, Mrs. R. H. Scheel, Mrs. W. G. Patton and Mrs. R. E. Each.

AS IN THE past, a number of exceptional books have appeared at the sale. Among the leather-bound volumes is a copy of "The Three Musketeers", still in its Cellophane jacket.

Another, "Outline of the Theory of Thought" was once owned by Miss Mattie Baldwin, for whom the Baldwin library and school are named. Miss Baldwin's sophomore classmates of 1860 are listed in the book which came to the sale from someone's attic.

Another rare volume is the 1852 edition of "Uncle Tom's Cabin". A two-volume set of the New Testament, printed in 1812, was also donated to the sale.

OLD SONG BOOKS, bound volumes of St. Peter's Magazine, the 1850 equivalent of Ladies' Home Journal are also to be found there. The magazine gives detailed instructions on the making of hugie portieres and other items in vogue at the time.

A leather-bound volume on book-keeping, which a hundred years ago cost someone \$7.50, can, at this sale, be purchased for 10 cents. The sale at the Detroit Edison showroom on Merrill street, will continue through Saturday. All books will be reduced to half price for the two final days.

The sale will be open from 8 a. m. to 9 p. m. today and Friday, and from 8 a. m. to noon on Saturday. Society deadline is 3 p. m. each Tuesday.

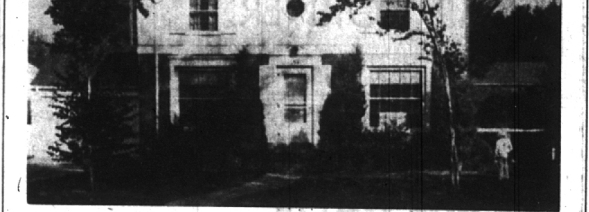

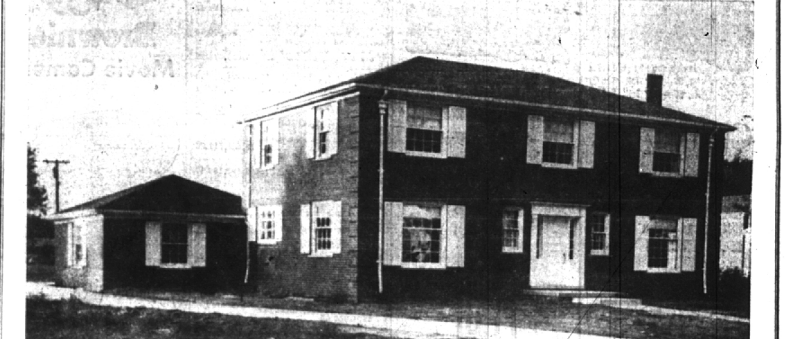
