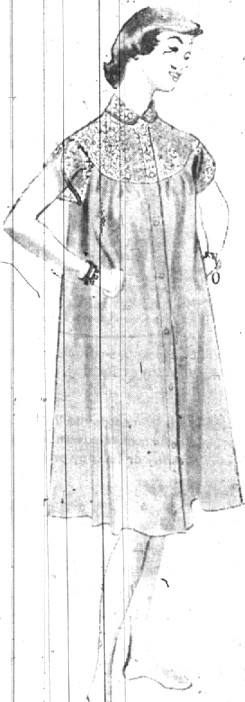

Use of Silicones Explained to Club

A relatively new industry, but one which is growing rapidly, was described to Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon.

William A. Wiard, Detroit office manager for the Dow-Corning Corp. of Midland, told how the discovery, development and commercialization of silicones is aiding the American public.

"A silicone is an inorganic compound, very close to glass, but which has atoms which can hang onto organic matter, thus creating a brand new industrial field," explained Wiard.

Over a very wide temperature range, silicones change less than any other fluid, he stated, making them excellent as extreme temperature lubricating oils and greases. He said silicones also can be made to become elastic, thus permitting them to substitute for rubber in places having very high or low temperatures, and in which rubber becomes brittle or begins to smoke.
