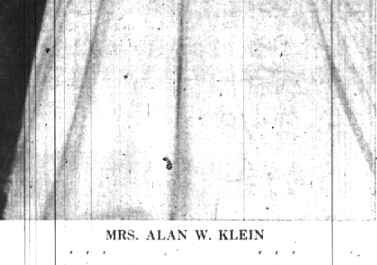

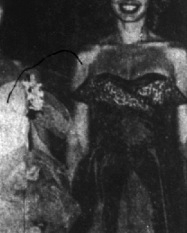
First grade mothers, Mrs. Carl Beier and Mrs. Columbus Pickard are presenting Michael Garrison, magician.

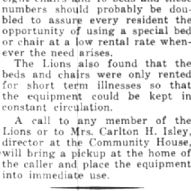
The Lions also found that the beds and chairs were only rented for short term illnesses so that the equipment could be kept in constant circulation.

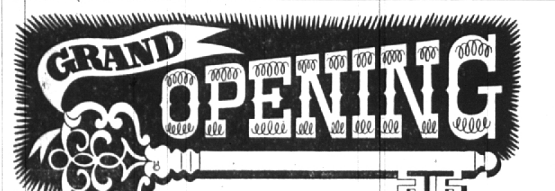
