

Pair Convicted In Lumber Theft

Convicted Friday on charges of disorderly conduct, two men were ordered to pay \$100 fine and \$75 restitution each, or to spend 30 days in Oakland county jail by Birmingham Justice John J. Griffin. The men were arrested earlier that morning for the Oct. 16 theft

of a quantity of hardwood flooring from a home under construction at 878 E. Fourteen Mile. Sentence was Dean D. McLaren, 27, of 1262 E. Lakeshore drive, Walled Lake, and George H. Kelly, 30, of 12160 Olympus, Detroit.

Police said the men were arrested through the license number of a vehicle used in the theft. A floor-layer, who arrived early to work on the house, saw the men loading the lumber into a truck. When asked what they were doing there, the men fled. The floor-layer noted the license number of their truck and reported it to police.

List Rules Governing Leaf Fires

The burning of leaves during the fall season always presents quite a problem, and many questions are directed to the fire department on the best way of burning.

To answer these questions we list a few simple rules to follow:

1. NEVER burn leaves on the curb or on any hard-surface street (concrete pavement or black top). City ordinance prohibits it and people doing so subject themselves to penalty.
2. Never burn leaves or other refuse outside of the home on a windy day.
3. Never burn leaves when the smoke from the fire will settle over the street in front of your home. It can become a traffic hazard and endanger lives.
4. Never burn close to a building (stay 15 to 20 feet from them), particularly one with wood shingles.

ONE OF THE safest places to burn leaves around the home is in a wire incinerator. If none is available, burn on a gravel driveway or in a burning area out in a clearing with a clear area all around it. Be sure that this area is not located where other fires will start in dry vegetation. If you burn leaves, never leave the fire unattended. Keep small children away from the fire and be considerate of the smoke entering your neighbor's house. If no place is available to burn leaves, put them into a compost pile for use the following year as fertilizer.
