Troy Trounces Madison As Norton Scores Twice

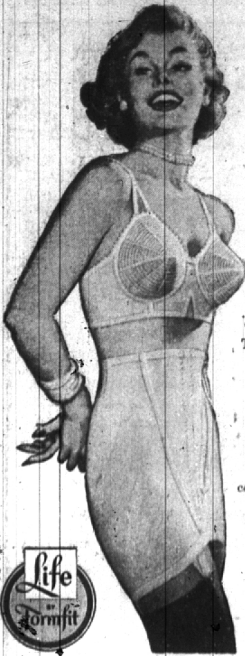
