Availability of the new Girl Scout Handbook is announced this week by Mrs. John P. St. Clair, chairman of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills-Franklin district. "This tenth edition of the handbook is presented during National Girl Scout Week," Mrs. St. Clair said, "a fitting tribute in memory of Juliette Gordon Low, founder of the Girl Scouts' organization. "It will answer many of the questions and problems which nearly every girl meets in her Scouting career. "The information is gathered to include all fields of Girl Scout work from nature study and field trips to home making and other topics.

"IT STRESSES their obligations as homemakers and citizens and, in keeping with the changing status of women in the world, provides girls with basic information for many careers."

Mrs. St. Clair said that since "How Girls Can Serve Their Country" was published by Mrs. Low nearly 42 years ago, more than 3,000,000 copies of Girl Scout handbooks have been sold. "The many books have been planned to serve as blue prints for the development of American girls," Mrs. St. Clair concluded, "and we fondly believe that they have served their purpose."
