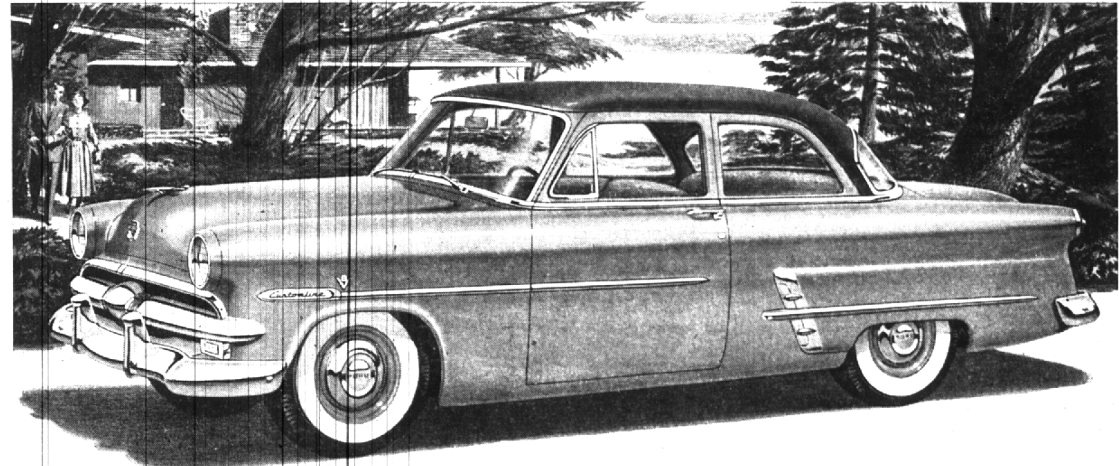

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OCTOBER RAMBLINGS

This is a mixed up period of the year in our business—after the lawn care—before the Christmas activity. However, a few things can and should be done.

- Select the tulips, daffodils and lesser bulbs you will plant in the fall immediately. Wait for cooler weather for tulips.
- Rinse out spreader and oil regulating plate.
- Water evergreens regularly until ground freezes.
- Plan to do some early Christmas shopping at OUR SHOP immediately after Nov. 1st. Lots of new and beautiful things for you.
- When through using sprinkler be sure to drain it if you leave it in unheated garage.
- Bone meal on flower beds, trees, shrubs, ROSES and PEONIES.
- Don't worry about mulching flowers, etc., until the ground is FROZEN.
- Clean up the BIRD FEEDER and fill it up with feed.
- Seven maids with seven brooms Can sweep the cobwebs off the moon. But if the lawn you'll clean with ease, Get a Parker-Springfield please.
- DON'S DANDY DIGGER is a darb designed to develop deep depressions in dirt for deposition of daffodils and (d)ulips.
- Cover 2 to 3 ft. of the trunks of new small fruit and ornamental trees and shrubs with TREEWRAF. It comes in 2" and 4" widths and keeps away rabbits and mice.
- If you don't receive one of our Christmas Brochures (ahem!) in a week or so, please let us know and we will send you one.
- Lock your yard furniture, empty milk bottles, garbage can, tools, et cetera in the garage. (This has naught to do with gardening. BOO!)

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
