AAUW Speaker Is Director of Industrial, Labor Relations

"An Educational Experiment That's Clicked" will be the topic of Artemis Kouzian when she speaks before the American Association of University Women Oct. 14 at the Community house. The speaker is capital district director of the extension division of the School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell university.

Miss Kouzian majored in sociology at the University of Michigan, receiving her A.B. degree in 1938. She was first employed in the occupational analysis division of the United States Employment Service and later was a member of the Bureau of Labor Statistics in the U.S. department of labor.

Working out of both the Detroit regional area and the division office in Washington, Miss Kouzian supervised the preparation of job descriptions for industrial wage surveys and bulletins based on wage studies.

FOR THE past six years, the speaker has been in the Cornell School of Industrial and Labor Relations. As head of the capital district office, Miss Kouzian conducts surveys and fact-finding tours throughout the eastern section of New York and the New England states. She plans adult education programs and selects instructors for the various communities where there has been a request for a lecture series on aspects of industrial and labor relations.

The school that Miss Kouzian represents is less than ten years old. Through the recommendation of a joint legislative committee in 1944 the school was set up, actually functioning first in the fall of 1945.

It is a unique experiment for an accredited college to offer both undergraduate and graduate training in a specialized field, and the extension division of Cornell University's school of Industrial and Labor Relations offers this service to labor, management, government and civic groups as well as for the general public.
