"Peer Relationships," a discussion of how children get along with others in their own age group, is on the agenda for Adams school PTA at 8 p.m. Oct. 12, at the school.

Speaker of the Monday evening meeting will be Mrs. Laura E. Williams, who received her master's degree from the University of Michigan. Mrs. Williams also attended Northeast Junior college in Kansas City, Kansas City Teachers' College, and taught grades six and seven in that city. From 1945 to 51 she was supervising teacher in the Vinton elementary school at Ann Arbor, grades kindergarten through sixth. She is a substitute teacher at the present time.

Mrs. Williams says that some children are not acceptable to others at the same level of development and many times a child and his parents suffer this type of rejection with no real understanding of how to correct the situation. Mrs. Williams will make this being, or not being, accepted by one's peers more understandable and point out some ways that parents and teachers can aid children who need guidance in this area.



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
