Maple Dump Lease Approved By City

Approval of a lease agreement between the City of Birmingham and the Southeastern Oakland County Garbage and Rubbish Authority for use of sanitary land fill dumping on city property, was given by city commissioners Monday night.

The agreement, asked several months ago, will be submitted to the authority for its approval. Terms call for a payment to the city of \$5,000 for the use of the West Maple dump property from July 1, 1953 to June 30, 1954.

The lease also holds the authority responsible for cleanup work on the site and sets regulations on excavations. Construction crews moved last week onto the Royal Oak township location of the authority's proposed incinerator and work was immediately started on the three-furnace incinerator, expected to be in operation early in 1955.

THE AUTHORITY, meanwhile, has returned an advance of \$7,738.50 to the city made last year to cover initial expenses of the authority.

With the sale of the incinerator bonds the authority has been able to repay these initial amounts to member communities. Commissioners authorized the placing of \$4,738.50 of the money to the general fund surplus and instructed that the remaining \$3,000 be placed in the garbage and rubbish disposal account to finance further city dumping at the authority's site.

Hardy Scores TD In Harvard Game

Bob Hardy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Hardy, 851 Hazelwood, scored for Harvard on a spectacular fourth-quarter pass play as the Crimson opened its football season here today with a 10-0 victory over Ohio University Saturday, Oct. 3. Hardy snared a long pass from Dick Clabby on the Ohio 38 and went all the way, cleverly eluding the Ohio defenders. Hardy played well all afternoon both on offense and defense. Early in the game he put Harvard in scoring position by recovering a fumble on the Ohio 20, but the Bobcats' defense held firm. A graduate of Birmingham High School, where he was football captain, Hardy also played basketball before coming to Harvard.
