Sewage Treatment Solutions Given To Commissioners

The city's answer to abatement of further pollution of the Rouge river was tentatively outlined Monday night before city commissioners.

The commission tentatively approved the recommendations of City Manager Donald C. Egbert to be reviewed October 30 at a meeting before the state Water Resources Commission.

Three steps in solving sewage disposal problems as outlined by Egbert include the city's joint action with other units to provide sewage treatment for that area within the city served by the Bloomfield Village and Acacia Park drains.

The city also will report to the Water Resources Commission that it will continue the study of costs of diverting present sewage treated at the plant from the interceptor running south through the city and through the Birmingham Golf course to the proposed Detroit interceptor.

The third recommendation asks that the city be given at least another six months before rendering a decision on possible abandonment of the present disposal plant.

The city wants to review possible costs of diverting all sewage now treated in the plant to the interceptor against the costs of continuing operations at the plant.

A letter including the recommendations of city officials to the state body will be submitted for commissioners' approval at next Monday night's commission meeting.

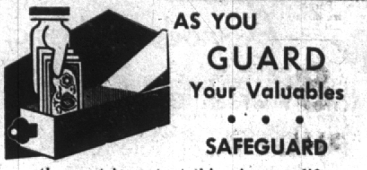

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DEEDS TO BE DONE

1. Dig (do not pull) dahlias. If you break the tuber's neck it will not grow. Store in dry cellar upside-down.
2. Cure gladiolus corns in shallow flats (*we have them) or boxes (*we don't have them) for 2 or 3 weeks. Then put in cold place (above freezing) for winter. Dust with NEU-DUST.
3. Still time to divide and plant peonies.
4. Plant DAFFODILS, NARCISSI, HYACINTHS, NAKED LADIES and LESSER BULBS NOW.
5. Get your TULIP BULBS NOW and plant them after October 15th. Try some of the lovely, beautiful, exotic, entrancing, rock garden species.
6. Do you like flowers and tulips, etc.? Well, get some BONE MEAL on those you like. For the others we have a material that will kill them dead.
7. When frost cuts the tops down, bring in for storage the glads, tuberose, begonias, calladiums and cannas.
8. AGRILITE is proving an excellent material for storing bulbs.
9. Mulch lily-of-the-valley lightly with PEAT MOSS. Same for pachysandra. When mulching ground covers and creeping plants add sand (Bhm. Lumber & Supply Co.) to the peat moss.
10. ROSES. Bone meal now instead of spring.
11. Dig parsnips and oyster plants (who plants those things anyway) for early use. The rest will keep perfectly in the ground 'till spring.
12. Plant herb seeds in pots for kitchen window sills. (We have the seeds.)
13. If tomatoes are removed from the vine while green they will ripen if kept in a dark, fairly warm place.
14. DO NOT permit leaves to accumulate on the lawn. If they get wet and freeze you'll be sorry. You have quite an investment in your lawn and since grass seed costs will still be very high next spring, it will be wise to take good care of it. Break down and get a good PARKER-SPRINGFIELD LAWN SWEEPER.
15. Why throw away your leaves and grass clippings. Pile them, add ACTIVO and water and have a pile of stuff good for gardens.
