

Much Planning Needed For AAUW Book Sale

Residents of Birmingham and neighboring communities, from merchants to busy housewives to school children, are combining their efforts this fall to make the annual AAUW book sale a successful community project.

The public will be able to pick up books at bargain prices. Proceeds will go for scholarships and to such local institutions as our schools, public libraries and state hospitals.

Held in the Birmingham office of the Detroit Edison company from Oct. 19-25, this is the 20th annual sale sponsored by the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women. Mrs. George Squibb is general chairman. A transportation committee of about 30 AAUW members headed by Mrs. Robert L. Garrison, has been kept busy all summer picking up books and delivering them to several collection points.

AS THE WEEK OF Oct. 19 draws closer, husbands and teenage boys will help out with the heavy work of carrying cartons of books to the Detroit Edison basement. It is here that Mrs. Gilbert Gove, with about 50 members assisting, will undertake the tremendous task of printing the books.

Since 1944 the Detroit Edison company has leased their first floor lobby for the sale, as well as providing heat, light and janitor service.

BOOK DEPARTMENTS of such well-known stores as LaBelle's, Mortimer's and the J. L. Hudson Company in Detroit have donated books to the sale. And many Birmingham merchants have displayed posters advertising the sale.

Press and radio help by carrying stories about the sale. Announcements of the sale are taken home by Birmingham school children, and have been passed out by the public library and one food store.

Such local groups as the PTA, League of Women Voters, Newcomers' club and the Business Women's club publicize the sale among their members as the time approaches.
