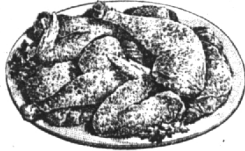

New Executive Appointments Listed by Ford

O. L. Wigton, widely known farm equipment sales manager, has been named general sales manager of the Ford tractor division of Ford Motors, according to Thomas A. Farrell, vice president of the Ford Motor company and general manager of the tractor division.

Promoted to assistant general sales manager in charge of field operations, the position formerly held by Wigton, is Russell B. Roberts, Detroit, former district manager, succeeds Robins as western sales manager.

Wigton joined Dearborn Motors, former national distribution organization for Ford and Dearborn farm equipment in 1947, as eastern sales manager and later assistant general sales manager.

Prior to this, he had held other executive sales positions in farm equipment industries.

HE ALSO WAS general sales manager for the Richmond Dairy company in New York City and manager of special products sales for Elintek Corp., Detroit.

From 1928-40 he was associated with Celotex Corp., in Chicago, starting as a salesman and working his way to the position of territorial representative and assistant manager in the Chicago division.

Robins joined the tractor division of the Handy Organizations in Detroit for four years as a vice president.

From 1945-47 he was general manager of the Major Fuel Co., in Stockton, Calif., and prior to that had been mechanical manager in St. Louis for the Halston-Purina Co., in charge of sales training and dealer development.

Dzorn, with Dearborn Motors from 1947-53, developed the efficient distribution system which moves tractors and farm equipment to dealers in all points of the U. S., Mexico, Canada, and Cuba.

A native of Elizabeth, N. J., he was associated with Nash-Kelvinator from 1925-47 and became manager of the order and distribution department in Detroit in 1942.

Schools To Start Savings Program

en Voters with the provocative question: "The President is the head of the U. S. government, the Governor is the head of the State government, who is the administrative head of our county government?"

A SLOTTED BOX near the poster with slips of paper placed near it invited passersby to answer the question. The public response was a great deal better than was at first anticipated by the LWV.

David Levinson, who has been on the county board of supervisors representing Birmingham since September, 1933, was asked by the LWV to supply the correct answer.

He said, "No one person in the administrative head of Oakland County government. The nominal head is the chairman of the board of supervisors, but the administration of the county's government is carried out by the board of auditors, composed of three members who are appointed by the board of supervisors, composed of 5 men and women."

MANY PEOPLE in answering the question on the poster replied, "The board of auditors," some answered "The board of supervisors" and quite a few said simply, "I don't know."

Of all the replies, the one of Mrs. John S. Lambie, 280 Aspen road, was judged to be correct. Mrs. John S. Lambie has been an LWV member for years.

The posters were used by the LWV to stimulate an interest in county government and to advertise the County Government Fair.
