

High School Cost Maximum Is Set By Hills B of E

In a two-hour discussion on plans education members Tuesday night for the proposed Bloomfield Hills told architect Robert Swanson that high school, Bloomfield board of the building could not exceed \$1,400,000.

Board members believed that Swanson should be given some idea as to the cost of the building so that he could submit more detailed plans.

Board members also voted to postpone the regular Sept. 21 meeting to Sept. 23 to enable Superintendent Eugene Johnson to attend the Michigan School Administrators Association conference at Lansing, Sept. 20-22.

At the Sept. 23 meeting Johnson will present his report on the building and educational needs of the Bloomfield school district.
