

French Exchange Teacher Reports At Kingswood

Martha C. Ritz, a teacher from France, has arrived in Bloomfield Hills to begin a one-year assignment at Kingswood School under the Teacher Interchange Program administered by the Office of Education of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Miss Ritz is exchanging positions with Kathryn Mae Myers who is already in France.

Announcement of this exchange program was made last week by J. Kimball Johnson, Regional Director of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, with headquarters in Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. Johnson said that in addition to Miss Ritz, six teachers from Great Britain are en route to this State for one-year assignments.

MISS RITZ is one of the 115 teachers from Great Britain, France and Canada who are currently in the United States under the Teacher Interchange Program for the fiscal year 1953-54. The French and British teachers exchanged with American teachers under the provisions of the Fullbright Act, 70th Congress, which authorized a Teacher Interchange Program. The program is sponsored by the Office of Education of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in cooperation with the Department of State.

Upon their arrival in Washington, the teachers visited the White House and met with officials of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, other Government officials, and representatives of educational institutions and organizations.

become manager of sales promotion and training, continuing to manage staff activities. Former head of the advertising department, he was manager of product sales and services.

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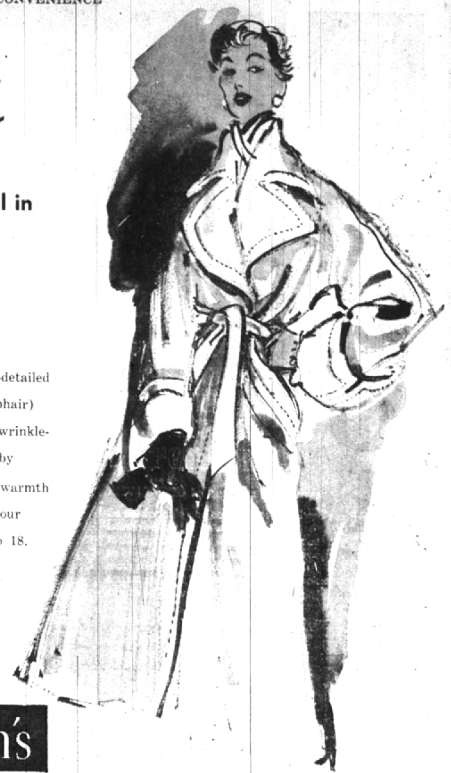
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
