

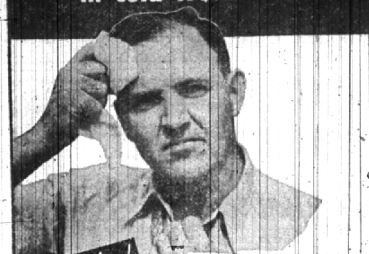
Real Estate Board To Meet Thursday
