**Discuss Plans For Bloomfield High School**

Bloomfield Hills' school board, in a specially called meeting Tuesday night, decided plans for the building of a proposed new high school should be drawn to include from 24 to 26 classrooms with a present capacity of from 600 to 800 students and with allowances for future expansion to house 1200 students.

The board also agreed drawings should include a gymnasium and cafeteria to be built now and a swimming pool and an auditorium to be built later. Board members expressed fear that a bond issue that included pool and auditorium at the present time would be defeated by voters.

**DECISIONS OF the board** followed a presentation of a project population report prepared by the Oakland county plan commission and delivered by Robert Swanson, of Swanson Associates, Bloomfield Hills architect.  
Further discussion of the board indicated that even with completion of the high school in 1955, elementary facilities of the school would be crowded.  
The board ordered that consideration of an addition to the Wing Lee elementary school should be placed on the board's agenda for its next meeting Sept. 21.

**A BOND PROPOSAL** to finance the school expansion is expected to be offered to voters sometime in October or November. Two previous proposals have been defeated at the polls.

Board President Edward A. Proctor said that Vaughan school, which presently is used as a high school, will be converted to elementary use upon the completion of the new high school.  
Site for the high school is a 21-acre plot bounded by Exeter, Andover, and Long Lake roads donated by the George estate.

**Porritt Area Development Up for Airing**

A re-examination of the proposed development of the 40-acre so-called "Porritt Property" on Adams road, 2 1/2 blocks south of Maple, is expected in the next two or three weeks.  
The city commissioners have asked the W. E. Reid Development Co., present owner of the area, to submit to the city for consideration next Monday night the company's proposals for the area, plus what modifications, if any, would be made of previous plans.  
After the city commission looks over the forthcoming letter, it expects to set a hearing date in September at which time the project will be aired.

**FOR MORE than a year**, city planners, commissioners and subdivisions in the Porritt area have discussed the pros and cons of single family duplex homes and the advantages or disadvantages of commercial development of the Adams road frontage.  
Originally, the plan board and residents wanted single family development of the area. The developers were holding out for duplexes as the most economical use of the property.  
Just recently the Villa road residents altered their stand to ask for single homes only on the street which would be immediately south of Villa.

**Rezoning Hearing Set For Oct. 12**

A public hearing to determine whether all business zoned property on the east side of Adams road from Lincoln to the Porritt property is to be rezoned to income bungalow has been set for October 12 by the city commission.  
The city will act on the plan board's recommendation to rezone this property to protect the area from any further commercial use.
