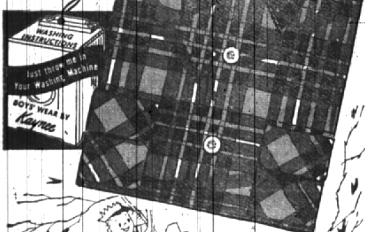


## Polly Kirby's Troth Told
