

Hearings Near on New Hills Zone Ordinance

Details of a new zoning ordinance for the city of Bloomfield Hills are presently being worked on by City Attorney William B. Hartman, according to John Graham, chairman of the city's planning commission. Under study by planners for the past several months, the proposed ordinance may be ready for presentation at special public meetings within a few weeks, Graham said. Such public meetings are prerequisite to adoption of zoning changes by the city commission.

City Manager Elmer Kephart said it stifl is too early to say just what the proposed ordinance will include. He added, however, that planners presently seem to be in agreement that there should be increased irestrictions on lot and house sizes in some areas zoned for single family residences.

HE SAID AREAS ZONED for multiple dwelling units

HE SAID AREAS ZONED for multiple dwelling units may be reduced somewhat and the number of dwelling units per acre in multiple dwellings may also be reduced. Property presently zoned for multiple dwellings is located mainly around the business district of the city and on both sides of Woodward Avenue. Kephart said no expansion or reduction of the area zoned for business seems to be in the offing. Business zoned property is concentrated around the intersection of Woodward and Long Lake road.

Both Kephart and Graham said that because of the variable nature of planning, and the many problems involved, no definite dates could be given as to when the proposed ordinance could be expected to be approved by the planning commission.
