**Townships Await Action on Bill by State Legislators**

action," Kenning said.

Cost to the city for the latest snowfall was estimated at between \$1,000 and \$2,000. Kenning said about \$5,000 of the \$18,000 budgeted for snow removal still is unaccounted for.

"This winter hasn't been bad. In 1951-52 we had to spend over \$20,000," Kenning said.

**THE HIGH WATER** that flooded basements Thursday figuratively spilled over into the Birmingham city commission meeting Monday night as citizens showed up to protest flooding that took place in the northeast section.

Leonard Westrate, 1585 Buckingham, told commissioners that residents in the Birmingham Estates subdivision had suffered considerable damage from water that swept down from the Troy township area which is owned by the Birmingham Development Company.

He said the water was able to enter the city because of roadways that had been cut through the property by the developers.

**THE CITY** closed the roads some time ago, and citizens wanted to know if the developer could be made to grade in the roadways and close the avenues through which the water came.

City Attorney Forbes Hascall suggested that an injunction could be sought by the city and the residents to make the developers regrade the property.

Commissioners agreed that before such action is taken, talks with other Birmingham Development Company and the Birmingham board of education, (which is seeking to acquire the property by condemnation, should be held to see if a solution to the problem can be reached.

**MEANWHILE**, the commission proposed to speed preliminary work on construction of drains to service the area. It is proposed to construct one drain from the triangle of property involved down along the Grand Trunk railroad to a tie-in with the Elon drain at E. 14th.

Also to be expedited is the Holland relief sewer which would assist the Elon sewer. This relief drain would run east from Elon on Holland to a tie-in with a major sewer under the Grand Trunk railway.

A recommendation to complete plans and seek bids for the Holland drain was approved by the commission.

Until the drains are installed, work on difficulties in the area to see if some sort of temporary relief can be effected to forestall floodings in the rainy season ahead.

Anderson said the bill passed the house of representatives, but ran into difficulties in the senate where several amendments were tacked on.

A committee of senators and representatives is now studying the amendments in an effort to reach a compromise, Anderson said.
