Rites Monday For J. C. Chatfield, Troy Twp. Native

Son of a pioneer Troy township family, J. C. Chatfield, 85, died at his 4445 Coolidge road home on April 9.

He was born on a farm within half a mile of his present home on Nov. 23, 1868, son of Edward F. and Ellen Brooks Chatfield, and spent his entire life in that vicinity.

In addition to operating his farm, Mr. Chatfield took a great deal of interest in civic affairs and served the township in official capacities for 50 years.

AMONG HIS various offices was that of membership on the town board, treasurer, justice of the peace, health officer, board of review and moderator for the old Leonard school board.

He married the former Ida M. Redick in Pontiac in 1906. She survives with three sons, Eugene of Troy township, Ward of Junction City, Kan., and Chester, at home.

Services were from the Dudley H. Moore funeral home in Auburn Heights on Monday, with interment in White Chapel. Rev. Dr. Tom Malone of Emmanuel Baptist church, Pontiac, officiated.

Military Rites For Spanish War Veteran Tuesday

Spanish-American War veteran, Alexander F. Streibig, died Saturday of a heart condition in the Dearborn Veterans' hospital. A retired army master sergeant with 32 years' service, he also fought in World War I.

Mr. Streibig, 78, of 1192 Cole was born Feb. 29, 1876, in Philadelphia, Pa. He married Lena W. Wallis April 6, 1914, in Leavenworth, Kans.

He was past commander of the Conrad Dettle camp 68, United Spanish War Veterans, and member of the American Legion and the American Legion Post 121.

Survivors include his wife, Lena, two sons, William and Harry, both at home, and two grandchildren.

Full military rites were conducted Tuesday with burial in White Chapel Memorial cemetery under the auspices of the United Spanish War Veterans, assisted by Veterans Service Officer Fred J. Gallagher. Arrangements were by Sparks-DeMund funeral home, Royal Oak.

Architects Chosen To Develop School Building Plans

Architectural firms were chosen at a special meeting Monday of the Birmingham board of education to develop preliminary plans for a new junior high school and an addition to the senior high school, according to Ernest W. Seaholm, board president.

Seaholm said the Detroit firm of Eberle Smith Associates was selected for the junior high school, and Robert P. Swanson Associates, Bloomfield Hills, was chosen for the senior high school addition.

The board is aiming at undertaking the building program without asking a millage increase, Seaholm said. Voters, however, would have to approve the diversion of present millage to finance the project.
