## Solving of Easement Claim Awaits Ruling

Until the Michigan Supreme Court decides the validity of a 1922 agreement regarding the mutual exchange of easements with the owner of property on Hawthorne, just east of Aspen, the city will delay a final determination of exactly on whose property lies a city trunkline sewer, according to City Manager D. C. Egbert.

"I don't believe there is any real need to press the point now, especially with the pending supreme court appeal," he explained. "It might complicate the situation if the city stepped in now with this additional element."

The SEWER lies on property whose ownership apparently is being contested.

Mrs. Clarence V. Gardiner, 607 Hawthorne, claims a recent engineering survey places the sewer on her property.

John H. Rosso, 771 Henrietta, who has been enjoined by the subdivision from proceeding with a home on the adjoining lot, believes the sewer is on his property.

The 1922 agreement, made by the then village council with the former owner of the lot, provided the village with the sewer easement in exchange for the owner's right of access across a tongue of park property.

When the subdivision took the case before Circuit Judge George B. Hartrick, he said the village council had no legal right to permit such access.

## Deficit Is Seen In Southfield School Budget

Unless the Southfield township school district gets a bigger share of property taxes with which to operate, it may wind up in the red by \$144,000 by the close of the 1954-55 fiscal year, it was revealed at the Monday night meeting of the board of education.

Board members voted to approve an operating budget for next year of \$1,213,160. Supt. of Schools Glenn Schoenhals said this was the minimum amount needed to meet next year's needs.

Anticipated expenditures are \$1,449,000 in excess of revenues. Schoenhals estimated revenues were based on last year's school district millage. The district's portion of the 15 mills allowed to be assessed for governmental functions in the county was 8.82 mills last year.

NO INCREASE in this allotment is expected, Schoenhals said. He pointed out that Southfield township itself is seeking a greater share of the 15 mills for operation. If a greater portion was allotted to the township, it could create hardship for the school district, he added.

The 1954-55 budget request is approximately 20 percent over the school's expenditure of \$1,029,400.

Eighty-two percent of the new budget is earmarked for payroll. Pay for instruction will be \$800,000 as compared to the 1953-54 cost of \$643,000. This increase is due to a recently voted salary increase for teachers and the addition of 32 teachers to the staff, Schoenhals said.

COST OF administration will be up from \$52,000 to \$56,150. Additional classrooms now being built will result in an increase in the cost of operating the school plant from \$129,000 to \$160,000. Maintenance will be up from \$27,800 to \$30,000, and capital outlays for furniture, transportation and grounds will increase from \$34,500 to \$40,000.

Schoenhals said the Southfield district has faced deficits for several recent years, but this is the first time the deficit has been so large. He added that in the current year, the district may end up in the red as much as \$147,000.

## Commission to Get Traffic Plan for Pembroke Manor

Birmingham plan board's ideas on how to prevent possible future traffic congestion on streets in Pembroke Manor subdivision will be outlined to the city commission at its meeting Monday night.

At that time the commission will hold a hearing on necessity of improving the streets of Edenhorough and to close one block of Edenhorough to the north is developed.

Planning technician Robert Boatman presented four possibilities of forestalling an undue traffic load. The plan apparently favored by the plan board was to open only Edenhorough and to close one block of Edenhorough to the south where it passes Pembroke park.

This would close off any direct north and south route through the area. On hand to hear the discussion were Pembroke area residents Joe Cramer and John Schneider.
