

# Students Disappointed In 'Careers Unlimited'

"Nicht sehr anregend" (to you "Not very inspiring").

This and many similar comments were expressed by Birmingham high school seniors and freshmen after their recent trip to Careers Unlimited in Detroit's Masonic Temple March 30, 31, and April 1.

Careers Unlimited, a product of the Detroit business world was staged to help metropolitan Detroit high school students gain insight into occupations and job opportunities. Industry argued it was costing too much money to send valuable personnel to the many career programs organized each year in the different schools. They preferred to pool their money and have one large program for the Detroit area.

In previous years Birmingham high school set up an occupational program called, Careers. Evaluation of the local Careers day indicated the high school students gained much knowledge of their desired jobs and as a whole enjoyed the program.

THIS YEAR Birmingham was asked to attend Careers Unlimited

instead of staging Careers day. After the trip, evaluation blanks were filled out by those attending. Almost unanimously they felt last year's program was more valuable than Careers Unlimited. Strange as it may seem, many felt "It wasn't worth the time. I would rather have stayed in school."

Other gripes indicated, "It was too long. Unlimited, the product of the Detroit business world toured the exhibits in 10 days." "There was very little time to ask questions at the exhibits." (Only 45 minutes were allowed to visit the 30 booths set up by the companies.)

MANY BELIEVED the companies made the exhibits advertising campaigns and did not fully show which job opportunities were offered in their lines of business.

The desire to have the Birmingham career program next year was expressed many times.

Because of the unsuccessfulness of this year's experiment the Birmingham high school counseling staff feels doubtful that local students will attend another Careers Unlimited unless some changes are made.

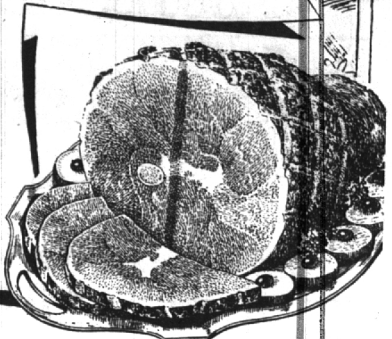

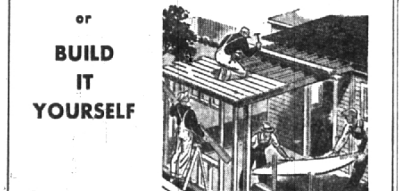
