SIXTY-NINE VOTERS TURNED OUT in Bloomfield Hills on Monday last week to elect three members to the city commission. Incumbents C. G. Eden and James A. Beresford were re-elected to two-year terms, and John S. Bugas was elected to fill out the remaining year of the term of Walter O. Briggs, Jr., who resigned last fall. It was the first election try for Bugas who had been filling Briggs' vacancy by special appointment by the commission. Eden, first elected to the commission in 1941, is beginning his sixth consecutive term. Beresford is starting his fourth consecutive term. He was elected for the first time in 1948.

Tryouts Saturday For Little League

Birmingham's fourth season of Little League baseball begins Saturday, April 17—weather permitting—when tryouts will be held at St. James and Pierce fields.

Fathers are still needed as coaches, umpires and farm team managers. Men interested in working with the Little League program are urged to contact Nickel at St. James field Saturday or National League President Chris J. Shearff at Pierce.

THE PLAYER auction at which major league managers will bid for the preferred players from the tryouts will be held May 10. Those selected will then join the team squads to compete against those back from last year. Each team is limited to 15 players when actual play starts June 1. Unsuccessful candidates will be assigned to minor league (farm) teams.

A selected group of players from last year's teams who are still eligible in 1954 have been told to report in uniform at Howarth Field, Davis and Cummings, at 11 a.m. Saturday to pose for newspaper photographs.

Managers of the eight major league teams met with the board Friday night at the home of American League President Cecil E. Nickel, 238 Westchesterway, and were informed of new rule changes announced by the national Little League headquarters.

The board announced it planned to observe a national rule that all boys, to be eligible for selection by a uniformed team, must attend at least half of the tryouts. This is aimed at making certain that every manager gets an equal chance to look over every new candidate. The board can waive this rule if it feels the absence is justified.

BOYS WHO played on major league teams last year are not required to attend the tryouts.

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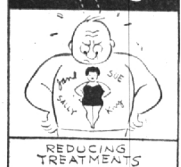
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
